1.1 Through our taught curriculum

Early Years	In our Early Years program, we embrace diversity and foster an inclusive environment that nurtures intercultural understanding, social justice, and respect for all. Our curriculum incorporates diverse books, family sharing, cultural celebrations, dual language approach, and international cuisine exploration. Classroom displays and discussions celebrate our community's diversity, promoting empathy and open dialogue about similarities and differences. The Puxi Promise reinforces expectations for respectful interactions, while engaging activities around the Global Goals empower students to be agents of positive change from a young age. By immersing children in an inclusive setting that values diverse perspectives and experiences, we lay a strong foundation for cultivating cultural awareness, social responsibility, and a lifelong appreciation for diversity.		
Primary School	At our Primary School, we are committed to fostering intercultural understanding, social justice, and diversity through an engaging curriculum. Assemblies feature perspectives from different cultures, allowing children to explain the intricacies they have learned. Our classroom environments visibly display diverse cultures through audits of engaging spaces. English, topic lessons, and well-stocked libraries incorporate books representing various cultures. Hands-on projects cultivate empathy, such as Year 4's task to create an inclusive classroom for those with sensory impairments and Year 5's SE21 project designing inclusive school guides with audio and 3D printed Braille models. Social justice is embedded, with Year 3 inquiring about unequal access to food and water, and Year 6 selecting more representative historical texts. Discussions around gender equality on International Women's Day and a Year 4 assembly distinguishing equality from equity empower children as agents of change. Through this holistic approach, our students gain a rich understanding of cultural diversity and develop a strong commitment to creating a more just and inclusive world.		

Senior School	In the Senior School, we are committed to fostering intercultural understanding, social justice, and diversity through an intentional and comprehensive curriculum. Our students explore literary works that develop empathy and appreciation for different cultures in English classes. Modern language courses celebrate identity while examining cross-cultural perspectives on education, food, and celebrations. Mathematics lessons highlight contributions from diverse civilizations, and science classes analyze human unity and diversity through genetics while honoring women's accomplishments in STEM fields. Geography delves into human development, inequality, and the UN's sustainable goals for promoting equity. Economics investigates wealth disparities across races and genders. Art encourages raising awareness of environmental and social issues while celebrating diverse artistic voices. Ultimately, our curriculum empowers students to embrace differences, challenge biases, and become agents of positive change in our multicultural world.
Ed Tech	Our use of cutting-edge technologies like AI and VR allows students to gain immersive experiences exploring different cultures from around the world. For example, our virtual reality program enables students to virtually visit and learn about the customs, histories, and ways of life in communities across all continents. Additionally, our Ed-Tech program emphasizes hands-on learning opportunities that promote inclusivity, such as the Dulwich Game Jam where we intentionally form both male and female student teams. By exposing students to diverse perspectives and providing equitable opportunities, we aim to build intercultural understanding, advance social justice, and empower our students to become globally-minded citizens who celebrate diversity. Our DEIJ efforts extend beyond the classroom through community service projects that address local and global inequities using technology solutions.
Sport	We recognize that accessibility to sports is a fundamental right, and we strive to create equitable opportunities for all students, regardless of their physical abilities, gender, or cultural background. In our PE classes, we explore adaptive sports and equipment modifications that enable students with disabilities to participate fully and experience the joy of physical activity. We also address gender equity in sports, challenging traditional stereotypes and ensuring that both male and female students have equal access to facilities, coaching, and competitive opportunities. Additionally, we incorporate cultural awareness into our curriculum, introducing students to a diverse range of sports and physical activities from around the world, fostering intercultural understanding and appreciation.
Creative Arts	Our Music and Creative Arts programs provide a rich tapestry for students to explore diverse cultures, gain intercultural understanding, and develop social awareness. In music lessons, students delve into the people, places, and cultural contexts that shape musical traditions worldwide. They experience the power of music to transcend boundaries by studying and appreciating genres popular across different societies. Art classes encourage students to embrace their unique cultural backgrounds while creating pieces that reflect their identities and perspectives.

Mandarin

The Mandarin curriculum at our college serves as a powerful catalyst for promoting intercultural understanding, social justice, and diversity. Through immersive cultural activities rooted in the local Maqiao community, such as the exploration of the traditional art form "Dyetie," students gain a profound appreciation for cultural preservation and cross-cultural exchange. Initiatives like the "Hometown Cards" project, where senior students proudly showcase their diverse cultural backgrounds, foster an environment of inclusivity and celebration of heritage. Post-summer travel presentations facilitate rich discussions, enabling students to learn about different cultures, customs, and perspectives from around the world. Moreover, the Year 11 Mandarin curriculum directly addresses cultural diversity, exploring traditions, values, and behaviors across countries, ethnicities, and communities, thereby breaking down biases and promoting cross-cultural understanding and respect
