



Join us in London for the Dulwich Olympiad 2019














A message from Dr Joe Spence Master of Dulwich College

I am delighted to be in a position to share the outline details of the forthcoming Dulwich Olympiad 2019 in London, part of the 400-year anniversary celebrations of Dulwich College.

This will involve a series of sporting, artistic performance activities and events with student representation from throughout the Dulwich group. This promises to be a fantastic opportunity for Dulwich College International students to travel to the UK to take part in activities and experience the broader cultural benefits of a visit to London

and our founding school. We are humbled as guests to be able to participate in part of Dulwich College's quadricentennial celebrations, and look forward to our students learning from one another as part of the Olympiad.

The Dulwich Olympiad is an opportunity that everyone associated with Dulwich can take a pride and interest in – it is a chance for our students to collaborate, compete and perform, allowing them to build even deeper connections and relationships as part of our family of schools. It will also certainly be a particularly memorable occasion for the international students who are able to represent their schools at this milestone event, and we hope to see many of you in London



SPORT

We invite squads of U13, U15, U19 and Senior School sportsmen and sportswomen from each school to come to London to compete in football, basketball, badminton, swimming and athletics.

We are delighted that James Allen's Girls' School are going to join us thus providing competitive girls' teams.

Football

Squads of up to 12 with 7 on the pitch at any time.

Athletics

The athletics will consist of individual events in 100m, 200m, 400m, 800m, 1500m, hurdles, long jump, high jump, triple jump, javelin and shotput and 100m x4 and 400m x4 relay events. There will be scoring A and B teams with space for other competitors, if required, as non-scorers.

Basketball

Squads of up to 12 with 5 on court at any given time.

Swimming

The swimming will consist of 50m events in Backstroke, Breaststroke, Butterfly and Freestyle. There will also be a 200m Individual Medley, 100m Freestyle and 4x50m Medley & Freestyle relays. There will be eight events in total for each age group.

Badminton

Four players per team split into two pairs and an individual competition.

The Olympiad will not be like a conventional sports tour. There will be little time to train as squads and the emphasis is very much on participation, enjoyment and celebrating all sport.



DRAMA

The Drama department in London is delighted to be part of the Olympiad 2019. As part of the unique celebration, we invite students from each school to be part of a full and exciting drama programme of workshops, rehearsals, performances and tours to top London theatres, including Shakespeare's Globe, in one of the most dynamic cities for theatre in the world.

To enhance the opportunity given by the network of schools coming together for the Olympiad and, to create a genuine sense of collaboration, we invite schools to celebrate the culture of drama by participating in an exciting collaborative production, based on Dr Faustus by Christopher Marlowe. To be performed jointly by schools from across the Dulwich network, this celebratory production will be one of the many highlights of the Olympiad, affording the opportunity for peer collaboration and the sharing of culture and skills.



It is envisaged that schools will put together a cast that can work on a part of this dynamic production, and then rehearse as a large collaborative company in London, bringing the production together. Due to the scale of the Olympiad, the performances will not take place in our theatre, but will be performed offsite.

We look forward to seeing you all here at this amazing event in 2019!

MUSIC

The Music Department welcomes participants to celebrate the Olympiad 2019, with a dynamic week of concerts, workshops and a collaborative gala concert. The music component focuses on and celebrates the diversity of musical style and talent within the Dulwich commonwealth of schools.

There will be a range of concert designs during the Olympiad from pop-up lunchtime concerts to a music workshop with the London Gospel Community Choir and from the party-style finale of the Olympiad to a formal concert occasion at the prestigious, recently renovated, Queen Elizabeth Hall on London's famous Southbank where all musicians will be able to join together in a number of collaborative pieces, including Adiemus, a new age song written by Karl Jenkins.



ART

We look forward to showcasing pupil work in the James Caird Hall in The Laboratory, home to the original lifeboat of Sir Ernest Shackleton OA and the suspended sculpture Exploded Paradigm (Inverted) by Conrad Shawcross RA, both embodying the symbiotic relationship between creativity and discovery. 2D and 3D installation work and film and photography by students will be showcased under the theme: "Make Your Mark"? Students will have the opportunity to respond to this theme, focusing on why art matters in a cultural, social, historical, political and personal way to them.

Art students in the Olympiad will participate in a collaborative installation project with Dulwich College. We have artists leading this project and plan an ambitious outcome filling our South Cloisters. There will be film projections and light installation as part of this, as well a large and exciting sculpture project for students to participate in. There will be a mixture of participation in art workshops as well as a tour of art galleries in London


COSTS and LOGISTICS


Costs

In regard to cost, for the Olympiad itself, the costs for individuals will be for the flights to London, accommodation, a couple of daily travel cards, some merchandise, the cost of some meals out in London and meals during transit.

The hotel that the students are staying in is on the River Thames with excellent views of London. The students will be in twin rooms on the whole. The accommodation cost is also going towards providing a function room for all the students to have breakfast in too.

The costs will be finalised by the individual schools once the length of their tour is decided. DCI and Dulwich College London will cover the costs of the Olympiad itself. In the spirit of Edward Alleyn and enabling participation to be as accessible to as many as possible, costs for participating in the event are being kept as low as possible.
